A Timeless Christmas Gift

Just over 3 years ago when Mary Smith died, she left a wonderful gift to Rochester Cathedral in her will - the family small-holding in Shorne, called Barratts Folly.

This October it was sold at auction for £370,000, and this extraordinary gift has been applied to support the Cathedral's music – as a 10 year reducing fund with the balance of the money going to the music endowment at the end of 10 years.

Mary Smith was confirmed here before the 2nd World War, and her association with the Cathedral was such that

she wanted to make a bequest in her will. As a small way of recognising Mary's gift to us we have established an Endowed Day of Music in her honour in November each year, on the date of her birthday.

This lovely gift demonstrates the way in which a bequest can make a substantial difference to the Cathedral. Enclosed with this issue of the Beacon are details of how to leave a legacy. It represents an unusual Christmas Gift which costs you nothing for the time being but endows the Cathedral with a timeless gift at some stage in the future.

At this time of year when our minds turn to the gift of Christ to the world, I wish you a very Happy Christmas

A big welcome to our newest team member! Debra McGee took on the mantle of Interpretation Manager on 15th November and is coping valiantly with getting to grips with life at the Cathedral.

Snow has once again caused chaos in the Education Department. At the start of the year our newly planned Brownie Badge Day had to be cancelled when Rochester became snowbound. The recent flurries have caused more disruption to our programme with the cancellation of Christmas Activity Days aimed at 4 – 7 year olds.

This newest venture involves a whole day of Christmas activities. Pupils are met by the innkeeper's wife who introduces the Christmas story. They then explore the theme further through a variety of workshops. By dancing like angels, designing Christmas themed windows, creating journey music, composing carols and going on a nativity treasure hunt in the Nave children have a chance to engage with the story of Christmas. The day concludes as we retell the story forming a live nativity tableau.

Education volunteers enjoyed an interactive day of training for these new activities....yes, many of them did

take up the challenge of performing the angel dance in the Cathedral and hidden talents came to light as we composed and sang in the crypt!

The Christmas activities were taken out to Warren Wood Primary school in late November, but snow has since disrupted the programme leading to the cancellation of Cathedral based activities and possible further outreach days. One school due to visit the Cathedral in December has asked if they can reschedule to visit in early January where our Christmas activities will take on more of an Epiphany theme.
