PARTICULARS OF MEMBERSHIP

THE Association of the Friends of Rochester Cathedral was formed in 1935, as it was felt that there were many who would like to be associated with this ancient and interesting church and to have a share in the preservation and upkeep of the fabric.

The Diocese and Cathedral of Rochester go back to the beginning of English Christianity. This is not to be confused with Christianity in what we now speak of as England, for Christianity flourished in Kent soon after the year A.D. 200, and although there is no proof of a Christian Church in Rochester in those early days, there is at least a likelihood that there was one. The Mission sent by Pope Gregory the Great, and welcomed and aided by King Ethelbert, secured the founding of the See of Canterbury about A.D. 597, and those of Rochester and London in A.D. 604. Close to the West Door of the Cathedral the foundations of the apse of the old Saxon Church were discovered—semicircular lines just inside the Cathedral mark the site—and the foundations of its Nave walls were traced running westwards across the cemetery outside. No foundations of a western apse have been discovered. The Cathedral Church as it stands to-day is an interesting epitome of English architecture from early Norman to the present century—the latter represented by restoration work.

All who care for this venerable church are therefore asked to join the Association of Friends of Rochester

Cathedral, and thus to help the Dean and Chapter to bear the responsibility of preserving for future generations a building which stands for so much in the history of our National Church.

Since the inauguration over 2,000 Friends have enrolled themselves, and their contributions have resulted in much valuable work in several ways. Important and necessary repairs to the fabric have been carried out, especially to parapets, roofs, and copings. During the war, funds were supplied by the Friends for defence work against bomb damage, blast, and fire. But it is especially due to their efforts that there has been revealed the interest and beauty of the Monastic Cloisters, its buildings, and its garth. The Chapter House doorway has been opened and the exquisite Romanesque carving of its masonry shown. Within the Chapter House, Priors' burial places have been discovered; the foundations of the pillars which carried a gallery across the west end from the dormitory to the Cathedral have been exposed; the refectory doorway and its adjacent washing-trough have been made objects of interest; and the fine vaulted archway entered from the main road of the Precinct has been opened out. Of the Cellarer's buildings some walls have been shown, and the Tudor buttresses clearly tell what King Henry the Eighth planned for the housing of his retinue. Funds are urgently needed for all this work. Will you become a Friend and help?

The minimum subscription has been fixed at 5s. per annum, which it is hoped will enable all who wish to do so to enrol themselves, but it is also hoped that many will be able to give larger sums. There is also a Corporate Membership for Schools, Colleges, Parochial Church Councils, etc., with a minimum subscription of 10s. per annum, whilst Individual Life Membership is £10, or Joint Life Membership, for husband and wife, £15 15s. Boys and girls under 18 years of age, 2s. per annum. Each Friend receives a Card of Membership

and a copy of the Annual Report is sent to each Member other than Junior Members, when published. A form of application will be found at the end of this Report and should be sent to the Honorary Secretary, The Precinct, Rochester.

Friends who visit the Cathedral and attend Festivals are asked to wear the Badge of Membership, illustrated on the cover. It consists of a gold scallop on a red field with the words "Friends of Rochester Cathedral" round the rim and the date of the inception. Badges are 2s. od. (1s. 6d. for Junior Members) and may be obtained from the Honorary Secretary.

THE CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

For centuries the Crypt has been disfigured by two ugly piers (said to have propped up a heavy mediaeval Reredos). We grumbled about them—as all our predecessors did, till one day someone said brightly "Why don't you knock them down?" So we did. And now people who enter the crypt stand breathless at the beauty of the new Trinity Chapel (see photograph). It was a very tricky operation, as we didn't want the floor of the Sanctuary to fall in. The cost about £550 is being met by the Friends with the help of a gift of £200 from a former student of the Theological College (who often used the Chapel). A further £341 was also provided to complete the present renovation of the Garth.

And now the Nave. Since the Choir was cleaned with the help of the big Appeal made by Dean Crick, we have been ashamed of the grubbiness of the Nave. The Architect wants us also to clean the whole of the exterior of the Cathedral to preserve the stone from rapid decay. This will cost an immense sum. The Council of the Friends has decided that the interior can wait no longer. So, with the ready approval of The Chapter, they have agreed to pay the cost of redecorating the nave as and when they can. It is hoped that this can be done during the summer, when there will be no big Nave services, and when visitors can see what we are doing and possibly help.

Last year's Christmas Card sold very well; and all the previous years' were sold too. Mr. Jago, Principal of the Medway College of Art, has promised a design for this year's card.

We are glad to welcome to the Council Rear Admiral I. L. T. Hogg, D.S.C., Flag Officer, Medway, Mr. W. E. Heath, and Miss S. M. W. Wootton. We are grateful as always to the Rev. P. M. Sharp, Hon. Secretary and Treasurer, to Mr. Cook and Miss

Hitchen, who give much help in the office, and to all the Friends, whose number grows every year.

May I appeal to Friends to do as they have so often

done and persuade someone else to join.

THE year is 1900. Talbot was the Bishop, who later became the first bishop of the newly created diocese of Southwark. Hole was the Dean, and the Canons were Cheetham (Archdeacon), Jelf, Cheyne and Pollock. The Minor Canons were Nash, who was also Precentor and Headmaster of the Choir School, and Blackie, who came back to Rochester many years later as Dean. The Organist was John Hopkins, succeeded on his death in August of that year by Luard-Selby. The Layclerks were Marriner and Voysey (altos), Oldroyd and Fearnley (tenors), and Holliday and Lord (basses). There were 12 choristers and 6 practising boys as now. The Vergers were Miles and Newman, and Hoadley was the Precinct Warden. Miles served the Cathedral for 72 years as chorister, layclerk and verger and was the original of Tope in Dickens' "Edwin Drood". He had five sons all of whom had been choristers. What a pity there is no tablet to his memory in the Cathedral! John Hopkins, like William Miles, also had five sons who had been choristers.

The Cathedral had at that time the tower referred to by Dickens as "the massive, grey, square tower". Prebendal House was still standing in the Cloister Garth and was the residence of Canon Jelf. But, on the whole, the Cathedral and Precinct looked very much the same as to-day. Prebendal House, an ugly redbrick building, was demolished in 1937 in connection with the restoration of the Cloisters for which the Friends are responsible.

It is often said that a cathedral chorister's life is hard. This is true, as, in addition to his ordinary school work, he is committed to services in the cathedral and the necessary practices and rehearsals. But the present-day chorister has a much easier life than did his predecessor. The discontinuance of Choral Mattins and shortened

services—not to mention generous holidays—have lessened the pressure on his life.

A typical day in the life of a chorister in 1900 began with school at 8 a.m.; at 9.30 coffee and biscuits were provided at the organist's house by Miss Hopkins. Mattins was at 10 o'clock, which was fully choral and included an anthem, as well as the Litany on the appropriate days. At 11 a.m. practice was held, which could last until 12.30. During this time the youngest boys were instructed in voice-training and in the theory of music. These practices were usually taken by John Hopkins' son Glanville (an old chorister), as his father was old. School began again at 2 p.m., and Evensong at 4 completed the day, except for plenty of homework. Wednesday was the "off" day from both choir and school, unless it was a Saint's day. There was no school on Saturday afternoon, when a full choir practice was held with the Precentor in charge. The boys wore Eton suits with caps on weekdays and mortar-boards with red tassels on Sundays.

Looking back, it seems there were always plenty of extra services, including one every Wednesday evening in Lent and services devoted entirely to large works such as "Elijah", "St. Paul", Bach's "Passion", etc. We had the usual school holidays, but the choral services continued throughout the year except for two weeks in August and this included one Sunday. Among those who frequently attended the services were Canon Jelf's family, Ben Willis, Miss Fagge, Mrs. Nash, wife of the Precentor and several of the Bedesmen. Miss Fagge joined heartily in the singing of the hymns but she did not approve of a processional sung before the service and, in spite of her obvious pleasure in singing, she remained silent until after the response "O Lord, open Thou our lips."

Some people nostalgically regret that daily Choral Mattins, except in St. Paul's Cathedral, is a thing of

the past. Settings of the Te Deum may thus be lost and some anthems, no doubt, will disappear: for the fewer the services, the smaller the repertoire. We are lucky in Rochester to have maintained so many choral services and such a high standard of singing.


