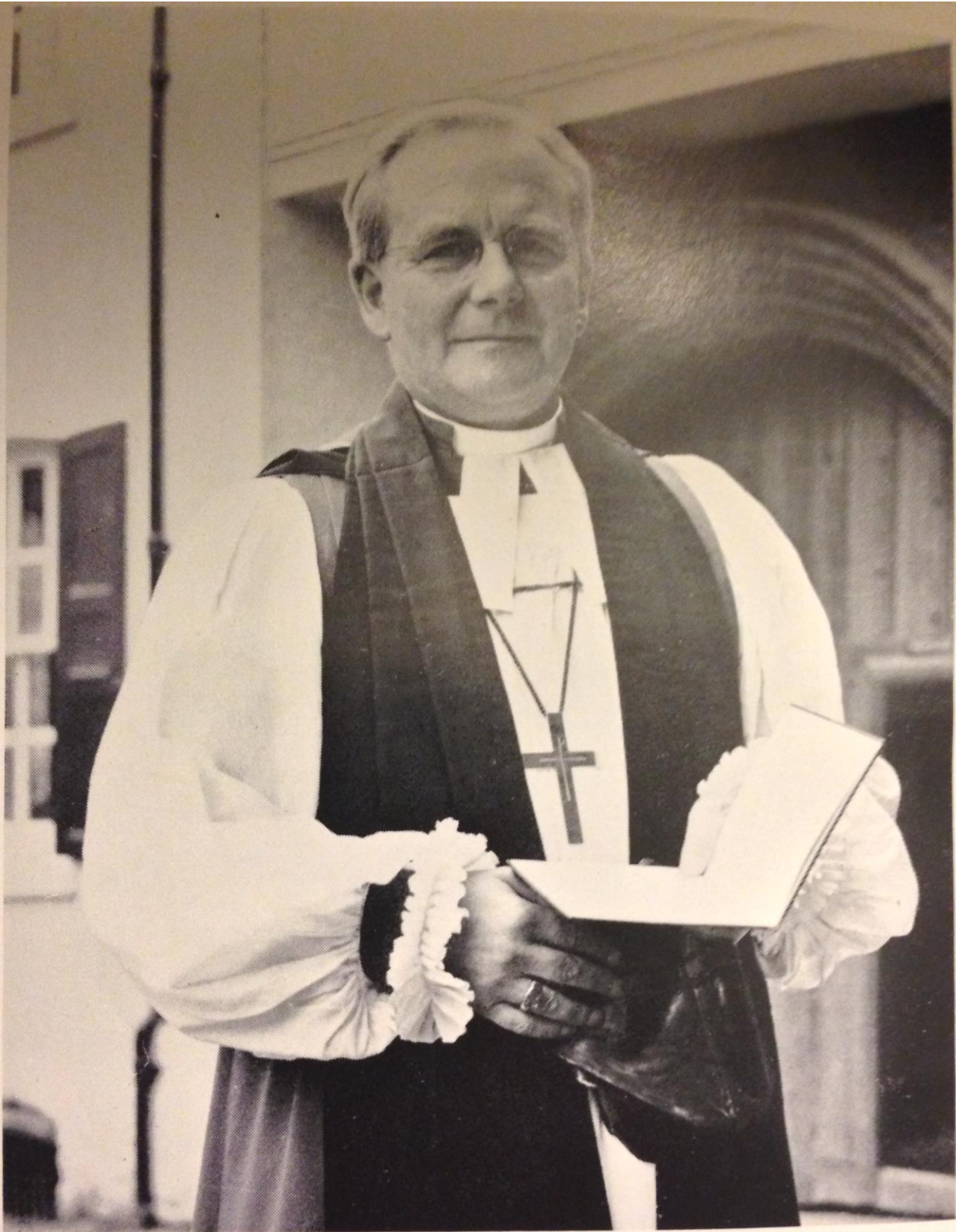

PARTICULARS OF MEMBERSHIP

THE Association of the Friends of Rochester Cathedral was formed in 1935, as it was felt that there were many who would like to be associated with this ancient and interesting church and to have a share in the preservation and upkeep of the fabric.

The Diocese and Cathedral of Rochester go back to the beginning of English Christianity. This is not to be confused with Christianity in what we now speak of as England, for Christianity flourished in Kent soon after the year A.D. 200, and although there is no proof of a Christian Church in Rochester in those early days, there is at least a likelihood that there was one. The Mission sent by Pope Gregory the Great, and welcomed and aided by King Ethelbert, secured the founding of the See of Canterbury about A.D. 597, and those of Rochester and London in A.D. 604. Close to the West Door of the Cathedral the foundations of the apse of the old Saxon Church were discovered—semicircular lines just inside the Cathedral mark the site—and the foundations of its Nave walls were traced running westwards across the cemetery outside. No foundations of a western apse have been discovered. The Cathedral Church as it stands to-day is an interesting epitome of English architecture from early Norman to the present century—the latter represented by restoration work.

All who care for this venerable church are asked to join the Association, to help the Dean and Chapter

bear the responsibility of preserving for future generations a building which stands for so much in the history of our National Church.

Since the inauguration over 2,600 Friends have enrolled themselves, and their contributions have resulted in much valuable work in several ways. Important and necessary repairs to the fabric have been carried out, especially to parapets, roofs, and copings. During the war, funds were supplied by the Friends for defence work against bomb damage, blast, and fire. But it is especially due to their efforts that there has been revealed the interest and beauty of the Monastic Cloisters, its buildings, and its garth. The Chapter House doorway has been opened and the exquisite Romanesque carving of its masonry shown. Within the Chapter House, Priors' burial places have been discovered; the foundations of the pillars which carried a gallery across the west end from the dormitory to the Cathedral have been exposed; the refectory doorway and its adjacent washing-trough have been made objects of interest; and the fine vaulted archway entered from the main road of the Precinct has been opened out. Of the Cellarer's buildings some walls have been shown, and the Tudor buttresses clearly tell what King Henry the Eighth planned for the housing of his retinue. Funds are urgently needed for all this work. Will you become a Friend and help?

The minimum subscription has been fixed at £1 per annum, which it is hoped will enable all who wish to do so to enrol themselves, but it is also hoped that many will be able to give larger sums. There is also a Corporate Membership for Schools, Colleges, Parochial Church Councils, etc., with a minimum subscription of £1 per annum, whilst Individual Life Membership is £10, or Joint Life Membership, for husband and wife, £15 15s. Boys and girls under 18 years of age, 2s. per annum. Each Friend receives a Card of Membership and a copy of the Annual Report is sent to each Member other than Junior Members, when published.

A form of application will be found at the end of this Report and should be sent to the Honorary Secretary, The Precinct, Rochester.

Friends who visit the Cathedral and attend Festivals are asked to wear the Badge of Membership, illustrated on the cover. It consists of a gold scallop on a red field with the words "Friends of Rochester Cathedral" round the rim and the date of the inception. Badges are 2s. od. (1s. 6d. for Junior Members) and may be obtained from the Honorary Secretary.

THE FLOWER GUILD

WE have had a good year with much support and help from all our members. Our Secretary, Mrs. Palmer, has done a wonderful work in keeping the Rota of flower arrangers going so well, and we are grateful for all her help in many ways.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

I WANT to begin this report by saying how honoured I am to be called to the Chairmanship of a body that has done, and is doing, such wonderful work for the Cathedral. Many of you went to great trouble to be present at the Installation on October 6th, 1966, and I want you to know how deeply I appreciated this.

The major work of the past year has been the cleaning and repairing of the East end of the Cathedral, and I am sure all will agree that it now looks very splendid. The new copes have now all arrived and we are very grateful to Mrs. Jonson for her excellent work.

It is important that the cleaning of the exterior of the Cathedral should continue, and the Council has decided that the next major project shall be the North Transept front. This is the view which many pilgrims and visitors first get of the Cathedral as they come up the Pilgrims Passage from the High Street. The Chapter is undertaking the work on the Western face of the North Transept so that the area can be dealt with as a whole. The re-furnishing of the Nave has not been forgotten and it is hoped that we shall get our plans clear before long.

The time has come when a number of covenants made by industrial firms are coming to an end. The present economic situation, with the freeze and squeeze, has been the reason for some of them not being able to renew their subscriptions. Naturally we are sorry about this, but we are grateful for all they have done in the past. Some of the firms have kindly renewed their covenants and one at least has increased theirs considerably. This is a particular encouragement, for which we are most grateful, at this time when it looks as if our income from subscriptions will be considerably diminished.

If subscriptions are likely to be down this is in some measure offset by two splendid windfalls in the course

of the year. An anonymous donor walked into the office and left a cheque for £500, and the Friends' share of the residue of the estate of the late Mr. J. T. Featherstone has so far amounted to £1,450. To the anonymous donor, and to the late Mr. J. T. Featherstone and his family we would like to express our grateful thanks.

One would expect Friends to be friendly, but the kindnesses and assistance which I have been given surpasses all expectations. The welcome of the Council has been much appreciated. I would like to thank the Rev. P. M. Sharp for the splendid way in which he has kept things moving in the interregnum and while patiently initiating a new Chairman into the intricacies of our work. Miss Neech has found it necessary to resign her work as Assistant Honorary Secretary after 17 years wonderful service. The Council has already expressed its deep appreciation, and the Friends are giving her a small token of our gratitude and affection. We all want her to know how deeply we appreciate all that she has done. I would like to add how much we owe to Miss Hitchen, Miss Black and Miss Harvey for all their unselfish service, and we welcome to the staff Mr. F. H. Sears, whose excellent work in this short time has put us much in his debt.

The Worship of Almighty God and the communication of His love is our purpose. More and more the Cathedrals of this country are the points at which contact is made with those without faith. What the Friends do for the Cathedral is to help to provide the conditions in which this task can be fulfilled. Many will go away from a visit to our Cathedral with a greater sense of the majesty of God and awareness of His presence, because of the good work that is done by Friends and staff.

THE ROCHESTER OF EDWIN DROOD

sometime Master of Selwyn College and Ely
Professor of Divinity in the University of Cambridge.

As one who was born in St. Margaret's 81 years ago, I have been invited to write down some personal reminiscences of my earliest childhood there. But I shall do my best to start from something much better than my own reminiscences. This is Charles Dickens's last and unfinished novel, *The Mystery of Edwin Drood*. In 1870 it was printed as a serial in a magazine. It attracted little notice at the time. And in the 1880's those who held that it was finer work than anything Dickens had written previously complained that it was still unappreciated. I doubt if my parents knew of it, or if it was much talked of in the Rochester of their day. Nevertheless, the Rochester they knew was the "Cloisterham" of the novel slightly up-graded and a little more awake, but fundamentally unchanged. It was still the little Cathedral city, linked up, beyond the Banks, with a Chatham thronging with naval and military life, and the home of cosmopolitan interests that flowed into it through its docks. They may have brought no opium den to Chatham. Dickens may have drawn his picture of the Princess Puffer's establishment from something he had seen in East London. But it fitted into the Chatham of his day with reasonable veri-similitude.

In my childhood the life of Chatham still did not spill over much into little Rochester. We saw sailors, but not many. A sapper from the R.E. barracks came over to be coached for his London B.A., which he attained while still a private soldier. But I am sure that I should have remembered if scarlet coats had been frequent in our streets, as they would have been a sight to take my fancy. Rochester still lived apart. The 16 years, however, that separated me from *Edwin*

Drood saw some awakening, by comparison with "Cloisterham". My father's coming from London to Rochester was to join the staff of Sir Joseph Williamson's Mathematical School under Mr. Bird. The building in the High Street still in use, was then new, and a token of modernization. My father, but newly wed, was able to rent a little house very conveniently for his work. It was a little way up the hill in St. Margaret's, about flush with Minor Canons' Row. "Mathematicals" did not have much contact with the King's School. And my father having been brought up Presbyterian, we should not have had much to do with the Cathedral but for music. The organist, Dr. Hopkins, was a friend to any and every local music-lover, and my father was such. So they became acquainted. Presently my father was privileged to receive private invitations to moonlight organ recitals. On a mild night with a bright moon Hopkins would go up to his organ loft. His invited guests would be let into the Cathedral by a side door. And inside the building there would be no sound but the organ, and no light but moonlight streaming in through the windows.

It is not surprising that my father began to attend choral services. Sunday "High Mattins" was a particular treat. And when there had been a small boy at the little house up the hill for about three years, his proud father was rash enough to take him with him, one Sunday morning, to Cathedral. I suppose that it was my first experience of a church service. The entry of the choir in procession excited me so violently that I had to be picked up and hurriedly carried out. The reasons for my excitement might make an amusing study in child psychology. But that is too personal a story to be recorded here.

The Cathedral body of our time was much more distinguished than that of "Cloisterham" according to Dickens. In 1885 Thomas Cheyne was elected to the Oriel chair of Biblical Exegesis at Oxford and came

ex-officio into residence as Professor-canon about the time that I was born. The Close was now a hive of industrious scholarship. Nevertheless it remained as withdrawn and self-enclosed as in "Cloisterham" days. A great friendship that came to us at that time also exemplifies the changing Rochester. It was with Miss Topple, another London B.A., who had a private school for girls on the Banks. It was not as expensive as the "The Nuns House", but academically no doubt was on a different plane. My first goings abroad from the little house up the hill were in my pram, pushed by a young nurse-maid. We took our walks in the castle gardens. There a small bag of maize provided entertainment with the pigeons. But the maize was liable to attract the attention of swirling and shrieking sea gulls. One of these great birds scared my nurse by swooping low over the pram. My father averred that it mistook my nose for a maize corn.

At that period, nothing large in the way of shipping came through the bridge. The upper river was wholly rural in its surroundings. And this had its disadvantages. For the wet banks at low tide bred ague, which attacked my father from time to time.

As I entered my fourth year, my father began to think of a headship. He applied for Longton Grammar School in the Potteries. He had lived in Middlesbrough and was therefore not himself unprepared for Longton. But the idea of taking his small son from Rochester to grow up in the Longton surroundings was too much for him and he withdrew. Shortly afterwards he was appointed to Henry Wreight's Commercial School at Faversham. Here we found a lovable home and he a noble life's work.

Rochester, however, was not so easily left behind. My Faversham boyhood was punctuated with visits to the home of one of the Mathematical School masters, Mr. Ternouth. And when the time came for me to go to Cambridge I was sent off on my bicycle to have the proper sort of tweed suit made by my father's tailor of

past days. I cannot tell how far the enduring spell of those Rochester years contributed to my father coming, in later life, to Holy Orders in the Church of England, or to my mother returning to be confirmed in Rochester Cathedral by Bishop Harmer.

The central tower of "Cloisterham" had, at its four corners, slender pinnacles. It was still so in my childhood. It would be dishonest not to say that it seemed more beautiful so. But with other changes that have been made inside the Cathedral and to the West front no one could find fault. It is high time, however, to leave retrospect and look forward. Nostalgia for a remembered past is a failing of old age. These days are at once more difficult and more bracing than those I have been recalling. New measures designed to enable the Cathedral to play an appropriate role in a rapidly changing social structure deserve our welcome and our prayers. And so may it be!

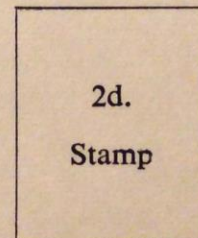
