### PARTICULARS OF MEMBERSHIP

THE Association of the Friends of Rochester Cathedral was formed in 1935, as it was felt that there were many who would like to be associated with this ancient and interesting church and to have a share in the preservation and upkeep of the fabric.

The Diocese and Cathedral of Rochester go back to the beginning of English Christianity. This is not to be confused with Christianity in what we now speak of as England, for Christianity flourished in Kent soon after the year A.D. 200, and although there is no proof of a Christian Church in Rochester in those early days, there is at least a likelihood that there was one. The Mission sent by Pope Gregory the Great, and welcomed and aided by King Ethelbert, secured the founding of the See of Canterbury about A.D. 597, and those of Rochester and London in A.D. 604. Close to the West Door of the Cathedral the foundations of the apse of the old Saxon Church were discovered—semi-circular lines just inside the Cathedral mark the site—and the foundations of its Nave walls were traced running westwards across the cemetery outside. No foundations of a western apse have been discovered. The Cathedral Church as it stands today is an interesting epitome of English architecture from early Norman to the present century—the latter represented by restoration work.

All who care for this venerable church are asked to join the Association, to help the Dean and Chapter bear the responsibility of preserving for future generations a building which stands for so much in the history of our National Church.

The membership of the Friends remains at about 1,100. This means that thousands have enrolled through the years but our new membership only just makes up for our losses. We really need a considerable increase in both individual and corporate members. Friends' contributions have helped to carry out work of improvement and maintenance in many ways. The monastic buildings and cloister have been opened

up and the garth is increasingly being used in summer months by those who are looking for a place of quiet, not to mention those who like to bring their sandwiches at lunch time.

The inside of the Norman nave has been cleaned and shows afresh the variety of its decoration. The new stone platform for the nave altar has been built and perhaps its greatest commendation is that it looks as if it has always been there. It has, it is believed, added to the dignity of worship and been an asset for productions of music, drama and ballet. While the work in preparation for this was being carried out remains were discovered confirming the theory that a pre-Conquest Church, subsequent to the original Saxon Church at the west of the nave, lay immediately under the present Norman nave. Contributions have not been confined to the building itself, but have much assisted in the maintenance of the organ. The steady work of maintaining the fabric has gone on and the cleaning and repair of the exterior has revealed still further the beauty of the building, particularly to those seeing it from the High Street. During the current year we had the shock of the explosion of the tiles. But thanks to the generous support of the Friends to the tile appeal we shall be able to cover the whole cost of repairs. In order to be able to continue the good work funds are urgently needed. Will you become a Friend and help?

Since last year the minimum subscription has been increased from £1 to £2 per annum. It has been kept as low as possible so as not to preclude as many as possible from joining. It is of course hoped that many will be able to give a larger sum, and we are very indebted to all those who give generously in excess of the minimum. There is also a Corporate Membership for Schools, Colleges, Parochial Church Councils, etc., with a minimum subscription of £2 per annum, whilst individual Life Membership is £20 per annum, or a joint Life Membership for husband and wife, £30. Boys and girls under 18 years of age 10p per annum. Each Friend receives a Card of Membership, and a copy of the Annual Report is sent to all adult members, when published. A form of application will be found at the end of this report which can be completed and sent to the Secretary at the Friends' Office.

Last year we inaugurated our Junior Groups. The Groups themselves are Sunday Schools, Schools, Youth Clubs, etc. The Groups at present enrolled are mainly Sunday Schools,

of which we have 11, with 91 children also enrolled. We are very indebted to Miss Quaife, the former Diocesan Adviser in Christian Education, for her work in bringing the scheme into being. Miss Quaife has now retired, but her successor, Miss Reed is equally enthusiastic and helpful, and we owe it to her that the children taking a part in our Festival, have their own interesting programme that afternoon. Particulars concerning the Groups will be most readily sent upon request.

Friends who visit the Cathedral and attend Festivals are asked to wear the Badge of Membership, illustrated on the cover. It consists of a gold scallop on a red field with the words "Friends of Rochester Cathedral" round the rim and the date of the inception. Badges are 30p (10p for Junior Members) and may be obtained from the Honorary Secretary.

#### CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

YOUR Council has continued its work, endeavouring with the advice of the architect and of the Honorary Treasurer, to determine rightly our priorities and to exercise in the best possible way our stewardship over the resources entrusted to us. The policy this last year has been to continue to build up our balances so that in the coming year we may be in a position to continue the washing and repairing of the outside of the Cathedral; believing that a stitch in time is the best policy. The Chapter are very grateful for all that the Friends do, and they will be looking increasingly to them for the kind of help which has already been given, in meeting the cost of the normal day-to-day repairs. The architect's Quinquennial Report has now been received and we shall obviously need a considerable sum of money over these next few years simply to maintain the fabric in good condition. It is a great encouragement to us that at the last Council meeting it was decided to make £11,500 available for internal repairs and the continuation of the cleaning and repair of the exterior. It is hoped that this work on the south lesser transept will be evident at the time of the Friends' Festival.

The Cathedral's Advisory Committee has recommended the appointment of a consultant archaeologist. We are fortunate in having in Rochester, Mr. A. C. Harrison, B.A., F.S.A. who is always willing to give his expert advice to us. I wrote to Dr. Harold Taylor, the Vice-President of the Society of Antiquaries, who is also willing to give help and

happens to be a friend of mine, and he wrote: "I am sure with Emil Godfrey as your architect you need no special help from an archaeological consultant, for I am confident that he is as alert to the archaeological needs as any special consultant would be." We are very fortunate in this.

Many changes in personnel are taking place at the moment. In January there were two splendid occasions when in the presence of great congregations the two new archdeacons were installed at Evensong on two Saturdays. We are delighted to welcome Derek Palmer, Archdeacon of Rochester, who has come to live with his family in our midst, and also Richard Mason, Archdeacon of Tonbridge, who continues as Vicar of Edenbridge. Joe Levett has served the Cathedral splendidly as assistant organist for some 44 years. At his farewell in September, the Bishop, in his sermon, and the Dean at the gathering in the crypt, expressed to him something of the appreciation that was felt by us all for his work through the years. Tokens of our best wishes were presented and Mr. and Mrs. Levett graciously replied. Mr. Levett has been succeeded by Mr. David Poulter. He is an excellent musician and an Old Chorister, and we are delighted to have him with us. Dr. Ashfield, who was due to retire in 1976, agreed to be re-appointed for one more year, and sadly he will be leaving us this coming summer. There will be opportunities later to express to him our gratitude for all he has done in the 20 years he has been here, and to extend to him and his lady wife our best wishes for the future. His successor has just been named and he is: Mr. Barry Ferguson, at present Organist of Wimborne Minster.

We have welcomed two new lay-clerks: Mr. E. D. Triggs and Mr. D. Goddard. We are very grateful for all that our choirs do for us and we want them to know how much their work is appreciated. It may interest you to know that we have more and more choirs from parishes and schools wishing to come to sing in the Cathedral when our own choirs are on holiday.

Special events this last year have included the wedding of the Vice-Dean's daughter, the County Royal British Legion Service at which two colours were laid up; a visit by the Bishop of Ely who came at All Saints'-tide to preach and to join with the writer in celebrating their 20 years in episcopal orders, having been consecrated together at Southwark Cathedral in 1956; an Oxfam exhibition, including lectures by the Director and Mrs. Judith Hart, and also

a Brains Trust. The United Nations Day saw a great gathering in the Cathedral from parishes all around for an act of worship consisting of readings and music and at the same time celebrating the publication of the Good News Bible.

Jubilee year started with a service for the Justices of the Peace for Kent and in March we celebrated the 900th anniversary of the consecration of Bishop Gundulph in Canterbury Cathedral. We were joined on this occasion by the Dean and Chapter of Canterbury and by representatives of the Tower of London and West Malling Abbey, both of which were built by Gundulph.

Canon W. H. Mackean is, of course, commemorated by the School House called after him, but his family wished to give something personal in his memory. Since he was a very keen librarian they decided to present a splendid knee-hole desk for the window in the Chapter Room. A number of members of his family were able to assemble for the little ceremony of presentation which took place last July. We would like to say how grateful we are for this generous gift.

The Friends' Festival last year was a very happy occasion. We witnessed the inauguration of the Junior Friends. We are grateful to the Hon. Secretary for all his work in this connection and I leave it to him to say more about this important venture. We wish to express our gratitude to the Hon. Secretary and Treasurer for all that he does for us and to his loyal honorary staff, Messrs. Sears and Locke and Miss V. Black. Their generosity means a great deal to our whole cause. We welcome as new members of the Council the new Mayors of Medway and Gillingham and Rear Admiral Christopher Bevan, the Flag Officer Medway, and also Canon P. A. Welsby who has now taken over the office of Treasurer of the Chapter. We want to say thank you to the Flower Guild and the Sewing Guild and to the "Brass Band" who keep us so well polished!

A pilot I served with in the War and who was killed at Alamein, at the age of 22 while commanding a squadron, left a diary which was only recently discovered, describing the Battle of Britain. He writes: "September 7. Twelve aircraft took off to patrol the Maidstone area at 15,000 feet. Seven came back. I saw Rochester and thought of Aunt Chris and Twopence (the cat), and the Archdeaconry." When the world was falling about his ears Rochester spoke to him of the eternal values, and his aunt's home of something of personal love and care. People today do not see the Cathedral and our Precinct from 15,000 feet while they are waiting

to be shot at, but they still see them in the midst of a very insecure world. They look to this splendid building to speak to them of changeless truths and eternal values, and they also expect human compassion and care. To the Friends we are deeply indebted for helping us to carry out this dual and glorious task.

#### HONORARY SECRETARY & TREASURER'S REPORT

IT DOES not seem twelve months ago that I was writing my last report, but it is true—twelve months have gone by. As together we look back over those months I hope you will see, with me, the sum total of all our efforts and be encouraged by the result. While complacency would be a foolish attitude of mind in these days, I think we can say that we have been faithful stewards of the funds which have been made available to us, and used them wisely, and to the full, in financing work on the fabric, and repairs of a more general nature, which have been carried out during the year on our beloved Cathedral.

With regard to our membership, we are sad at losing 27 members by death during the year, and a further number mainly by lapsed membership. This is only to be expected as we approach our 50 years of service, and those who joined in the early years are now elderly, and in the course of time many have moved away and we have lost touch. But the impact of these losses has been greatly eased for us as 43 new members have joined us during the year, and our present total membership of 1,077 shows only a small drop.

If you compare the relative figures in the Accounts you will see that our subscription income shows a substantial increase. This is due to the very generous efforts made by so many of you to increase your subscriptions, some in response to the letter sent out at the time of Tile Appeal, some quite spontaneously when the renewal date came round. Our subscriptions for the coming year should be helped by the fact that the November Council accepted an Executive Committee recommendation to raise the minimum subscription from £1 to £2, Life Membership from £10 to £20, with £30 for husband and wife. These only apply of course to new members, but there is an increasing number of old members who have of their own accord increased their subscription to £2. This generous gesture by such a large percentage of our membership is very encouraging, and is keeping at bay the menace of inflation upon our income. Here I would like to express my appreciation of all



those who are now paying their subscription by Banker's Order, thus effecting a mutual saving in postage. There was a small section of our membership who were paying under £1 some only 25 pence. They were quite entitled to do so, as increases do not appear to have been made retrospective, but with the cost of the Report around 35p these subscriptions were not, or only just, covering the cost. They were all, 80 of them, circularised in December and as a result 20 responded by increasing their present total subscriptions of £10 to a future total of £40. This is encouraging, and we still hope to hear from the other 60. The amount of subscription they are paying suggests they are members of long standing, and may have not yet got round to dealing with my letter.

I would like to make a few comments on figures. We still keep a close watch on expenses, the main item being the Annual Report. This year we have again accepted the lowest quotation, but there has been an increase due to rising costs, and allowing for postage each copy, as I have noted above, will cost around 35 pence. I mention this so that it can be borne in mind, but there is of course no thought of discontinuing this valued link with our widely scattered membership.

We have paid our usual grant of £400 towards the upkeep of Garth garden, and have paid the total cost of the repair of the tiles amounting to £3,516.30. Of this sum £1,776.09 came from the Tile Repair Fund, and the balance from General Funds. At the recent Council the Dean took us through the Architect's report of the work needed to be carried out, and three phases in which it is suggested the work should proceed, giving priority to the most essential. The total cost will be around £11,500. It was agreed that the Friends make available the sum of £11,500, to be called upon as and when needed as the work progresses. So we are already committed to give the Dean and Chapter generous support during the coming year.

This year there are eight members of the Council who are due to retire, their names will be found at the front of this report. I am pleased to say that all have expressed their willingness to stand for re-election. In addition other nominations can be sent to the Friends' Office up to the end of May. Please assure that the person nominated is willing to stand. It is regretted that nominations cannot be received from the floor on 11th June, in accordance with established custom. In this connection it was pointed out at Council

that we have only three ladies on the Council, some recently retired have not been replaced by ladies. There must be some very able ladies who have a contribution to make to our deliberations, will you please bear this in mind when thinking of nominations?

With regard to the Festival, you will remember last year our Junior Groups were brought into being. We now have 11 groups and 91 children enrolled. A suggestion was made that they be invited to entertain us after the A.G.M., and before Evensong. Miss P. Reed, Miss Quaife's successor, has contacted the Group leaders, and two groups are willing to put on a short entertainment. The remaining children will be invited to come and watch, and afterwards they will have their own tea party and games. We are pleased because it will make the children feel that as Junior Friends they are involved with us in concern for the needs of the Cathedral. I am indebted to Miss Reed for so enthusiastically undertaking the organisation of the event.

I cannot end this report without expressing my sincere thanks and appreciation to all members of the office staff, for all their help and support during the year. Mr. Lock works very hard, and among other things is responsible for the Post Card Stand. This means a trip to the Cathedral each day in the season replenishing the stand, keeping a close check on sales and stocks, and ordering wisely. A glance at the accounts will show the profit made, and give some indication of the importance of this particular activity. Mr. Sears has given faithful service throughout the year, and we have had the benefit of his experience over a long period of service to the Friends. All Covenants and tax forms are his domain. Miss Black, who has her own particular duties has had several spells of ill health this year, but always comes back as soon as possible. She has recently recovered from a period when she was housebound, and we hope now she has a long period ahead of well deserved good health.

There are many who help us in various ways. All members know the valued advice and help given us by Mr. Pollock in connection with our investments, and also Mr. Hoby and his staff, who again are auditing our accounts. We are very indebted to Mr. Hoby for this valued service. There are those who help in other ways, including those who help deliver Reports, thus saving us a sizeable sum in postage. I would particularly mention Mr. Austin of Arnold, Tuff, and Grimwade who prepares all our Tax Claims—a

tremendous help. When I expressed my thanks he replied "It's just my little bit!" That seems to be the attitude of everybody connected with the Friends, and in this we are very fortunate and it makes our work very enjoyable.
