#### PARTICULARS OF MEMBERSHIP

THE Association of the Friends of Rochester Cathedral was formed in 1935, as it was felt that there were many who would like to be associated with this ancient and interesting church and to have a share in the preserva-

tion and upkeep of the fabric.

The Diocese and Cathedral of Rochester go back to the beginning of English Christianity. This is not to be confused with Christianity in what we now speak of as England, for Christianity flourished in Kent soon after the year A.D. 200, and although there is no proof of a Christian Church in Rochester in those early days, there is at least a likelihood that there was one. The Mission sent by Pope Gregory the Great, and welcomed and aided by King Ethelbert, secured the founding of the See of Canterbury about A.D. 597, and those of Rochester and London in A.D. 604. Close to the West Door of the Cathedral the foundations of the apse of the old Saxon Church were discovered—semicircular lines just inside the Cathedral mark the site—and the foundations of its Nave walls were traced running westwards across the cemetery outside. No foundations of a western apse have been discovered. The Cathedral Church as it stands to-day is an interesting epitome of English architecture from early Norman to the present century—the latter represented by restoration work.

All who care for this venerable church are therefore asked to join the Association of Friends of Rochester

Cathedral, and thus to help the Dean and Chapter to bear the responsibility of preserving for future generations a building which stands for so much in the history of our National Church.

Since the inauguration over 1,600 Friends have enrolled themselves, and their contributions have resulted in much valuable work in several ways. Important and necessary repairs to the fabric have been carried out, especially to parapets, roofs, and copings. During the war, funds were supplied by the Friends for defence work against bomb damage, blast, and fire. But it is especially due to their efforts that there has been revealed the interest and beauty of the Monastic Cloisters, its buildings, and its garth. The Chapter House doorway has been opened and the exquisite Romanesque carving of its masonry shown. Within the Chapter House, Priors' burial places have been discovered; the foundations of the pillars which carried a gallery across the west end from the dormitory to the Cathedral have been exposed; the refectory doorway and its adjacent washing-trough have been made objects of interest; and the fine vaulted archway entered from the main road of the Precinct has been opened out. Of the Cellarer's buildings some walls have been shown, and the Tudor buttresses clearly tell what King Henry the Eighth planned for the housing of his retinue. Funds are urgently needed for all this work. Will you become a Friend and help?

The minimum subscription has been fixed at 5s. per annum, which it is hoped will enable all who wish to do so to enrol themselves, but it is also hoped that many will be able to give larger sums. There is also a Corporate Membership for Schools, Colleges, Parochial Church Councils, etc., with a minimum subscription of 10s. per annum, whilst Individual Life Membership is £10, or Joint Life Membership, for husband and wife, £15 15s. Boys and girls under 18 years of age, 2s. per annum. Each Friend receives a Card of Membership and a copy of the Annual Report is sent to each

Member other than Junior Members, when published. A form of application will be found at the end of this Report and should be sent to the Honorary Secretary,

The Deanery, Rochester.

Friends who visit the Cathedral and attend Festivals are asked to wear the Badge of Membership, illustrated on the cover. It consists of a gold scallop on a red field with the words "Friends of Rochester Cathedral" round the rim and the date of the inception. Badges are 1s. 6d. (1s. for Junior Members) and may be obtained from the Honorary Secretary.

## THE ANNUAL REPORT

FRIENDS will notice that this year's Annual Report is produced in an abbreviated and less expensive form than in past years. This is to be regretted but Members of the Association will realise that it is necessitated by

rising costs.

The past year has seen the membership maintained at much the same level. In addition to some forty new members we gratefully welcome some new Life Members, the High Sheriff of Kent and Mrs. Dedrick; the Commander-in-Chief, Admiral Sir Cecil Harcourt, K.C.B., C.B.E.; the Headmaster of the King's School and Mrs. Davies; Mr. W. B. Bragg; Mr. W. H. Day, and Mrs. Stratton. The recent death of Mr. Stratton, himself a Life Member, is widely regretted throughout the Medway Towns.

Among new Corporate Members we are very glad to see the recently revived Cathedral Old Choristers

Association.

In speaking of the membership of the Association I would like to stress the importance of securing Covenanted Subscribers, a matter emphasised in the last Annual Report, and to express our gratitude to the twenty-five members who have already agreed to become Covenanted Subscribers.

The suggestion has been made that it would be a great help to the Association if in some at least of the Rural Deaneries or the Parishes someone would volunteer to act as a representative of the Association, giving information as to its aims and objects and thereby securing new members in the district. The Dean would be very grateful to hear of any such possible help.

The Council

It was a great shock to hear of the sudden and quite unexpected death of the Rev. Sir Henry Fitzmaurice, an enthusiastic member of the Council and extremely regular in his attendance at its meetings. We offer our deepest sympathy to Lady Fitzmaurice and we remember with gratitude that he was our Preacher at the

Festival Service last year.

In the course of the year Mrs. Blackie has resigned from the Council on going to live in another Diocese, and we shall always remember that in 1940 in the early months of the war she was good enough to shoulder the burden of the Honorary Secretaryship until relieved by Sir Edward Stubbs. Major General B. C. Davey, C.B., C.B.E., commanding the School of Military Engineering, has also resigned on leaving his Command. We thank both these members of the Council for all the help which they gave to the Association. General Davey did much to foster the association between the Cathedral and the Corps of Royal Engineers, particularly in the great interest he always took in the Annual Memorial Service.

We welcome to the Council three new members, Brigadier C. E. A. Browning; the Ven. W. M. Browne, Archdeacon Emeritus, and now residing at Tunbridge Wells; and Admiral Sir Henry R. Moore, who was an ex-officio member of the Council when Commander-in-Chief The Nore. To two members of the Council, Sir William Nottidge and Sir Albert Stern we offer our congratulations on their appointments as Deputy Lieutenants of the County.

Finance

The audited accounts for the financial year ended on 30th September, 1951, will be found in pages 14 and

15 of this Report.

The Credit balance at the Bank and in hand on that date amounted to £183 13s. 8d., and the sum of £782 3s. was invested in the Trustees Savings Bank, making a total of £965 16s. 8d.

A grant of £500 was made in July, 1951, towards

the cost of improvements to the Chapter Garth.

The balance of our funds on 31st March, 1952, amounted to £1,060, of which amount £1,055 12s. 10d.

is deposited with the Trustees Savings Bank.

We tender sincere thanks and are most grateful to Mr. Lawrance Bull for having once again carried out, in an honorary capacity, the annual audit of our Accounts.

#### The Cathedral

The Cathedral has suffered the loss of its Consulting Architect by the much regretted death of Mr. W. A. Forsyth who for so many years has kept a wise and careful watch over the Cathedral fabric. We have been fortunate in securing as his successor Mr. W. E. Godfrey, who will have the assistance of Mr. J. S. Baldwin, a local Architect, as Surveyor. Mr. Godfrey, on taking over his appointment, has made a most careful and detailed examination of the whole fabric, and his report is awaited with interest.

In the last Report we referred to the alarming expense for essential repair work which now faces the Dean and Chapter, and to the generous promise of a Grant towards these expenses by the Trustees of the Pilgrim Trust. Their gift of five thousand pounds has now been received and is a great encouragement in facing the heavy and unavoidable costs of fabric repair.

The Friends have continued their customary generous gifts, not only towards the cost of fabric repairs but also for the further improvement of the Cloister Garth. The unsightly red brick wall has been entirely removed and replaced by an iron railing giving an uninterrupted view of the South side of the Cathedral and the Garth. In memory of Bishop and Mrs. Lanchester King some ladies, who worked under the Bishop's direction as Bishop's Messengers some years ago, have given a Flowering Tree which will one day be a thing of great beauty, and also a supply of plants for the adornment of the Garth.

The Association has received a legacy of £100 under

the Will of Second Lieutenant J. K. A. Firth, Royal Engineers. This young Officer, while serving at Chatham, was greatly attracted to the Cathedral and a year ago be became a member of our Association. He was killed in action in Korea shortly before Christmas. We are grateful for his recollection of the Cathedral and we offer our very deep sympathy to Dr. and Mrs. Firth in the loss of their gallant son.

The Cathedral has as usual been much used for big Services of a public nature, among them, of course, being the official Memorial Service of His Late Majesty, King George VI. A very sad occasion was the funeral service of twenty Royal Marine Cadets accidentally killed on the public highway. The Area Branch of the N.F.U. again held their Harvest Festival Service in the Cathedral as also did the R.A.F. Association on the Anniversary of the Battle of Britain. In November we had the pleasure of seeing the Ven. L. W. Harland Instituted as the new Archdeacon of Rochester and Installed as a Canon Residentiary of the Cathedral. We have with sorrow to record the death of Canon W. Parker, the former Headmaster of the King's School and a much loved personality in the Cathedral and City.

Gundulph Bible

All traces of this famous Bible, once amongst the greatest treasures of the Cathedral, were lost from the time of the suppression of the Monastery to the year 1734 when it was sold at Amsterdam by a Dutch clergyman. Later in the same century it was sold at Louvain for two thousand florins and in 1827 it passed into the collection of Sir Thomas Phillipps for one hundred and eighty-nine pounds. But a year ago the Dean received an interesting letter from Mr. Carl Wootton, an old King's School boy, saying that to his great surprise he had come across the Gundulph Bible in the Henry E. Huntington Library and Art Gallery at San Marino in California. Mr. Wootton was told

that it would be impossible for the authorities to part with the Bible, but how greatly we wish that this most venerable treasure could be restored to its original home. This famous Bible is in two volumes written in Latin on parchment and on the first leaf of each volume is a threat of excommunication to anyone who removes either the Bible or the page on which the threat is written. The volumes are bound with wooden boards and white leather.

#### Ladies' Guild

The members of the Guild have continued their work throughout the year and have been particularly engaged in the making of a Carpet which on completion will be placed in front of the Nave Altar and cover the space between the Choir Stalls. The various members of the Guild work on their separate sections in their own homes and we believe that certain of them have found enthusiastic assistants in their husbands. It is hoped that this very fine Carpet, which has already received much publicity in the Press at home and overseas, may be completed in time for the Friends Festival. Other members of the Guild have continued their faithful and painstaking attentions to the brasswork in the Cathedral.

The Festival of 1951

We have again to express our gratitude to the Orchestra of the Royal Engineers for a most delightful recital of music on the evening preceding the Festival. On the Festival Day the Dean celebrated the Holy Communion in the early morning and there was the usual Choral Eucharist at 11.30. In the afternoon the Annual Meeting was followed by the Festival Service in the Cathedral at which the sermon was preached by the late Sir Henry Fitzmaurice. The Tea in the Deanery Garden was attended by a large number of members of the Association after which many of them attended the Dickens Pageant in the lovely setting of the Castle

Grounds. We are always very grateful to the members of the Association who manage, no doubt often at some inconvenience, to attend the Festival. To us at the Cathedral their presence is both a great pleasure and an encouragement.

The Festival of 1952

This year the Festival Day will be Saturday, June 21st. The preacher at the Festival Service will be the Archdeacon of Rochester, and the arrangements for the morning and afternoon will be similar to those of previous years. This year however, an innovation will be a Play to be given in the Cathedral in the early evening after tea. One of our members, Miss Aline Shinkwin, has kindly written the play entitled "The Baker Saint", and it is to be performed by the Medway Theatre Guild. The play is concerned with St. William of Perth, whose shrine in the Cathedral was a famous place of pilgrimage in the thirteenth and fourteenth centuries and whose name is still commemorated in various parts of the City. It will be presented in the Nave on a stage to be erected on the steps leading to the Quire, and it is hoped that all this will be of real interest to the Friends who attend the Festival as well as to the general public. Further details are given in the accompanying notice of the Festival.

I cannot conclude without again making acknowledgement of our indebtedness to the Hon. Treasurer, the Hon. Secretary and his Assistant, and all those who in various ways help our Association to carry on its work and to prosper.

"SIR,

No spot in the Medway Towns presents a more attractive appearance than the area in which stand the Cathedral and the Castle of Rochester, and those whose daily avocations or whose walks abroad take them through the Cathedral Precinct will not have failed to notice the remarkable improvement achieved in recent months by the improved layout of the Cloister Garth, and more particularly by the removal of the old unsightly brick walls which previously hid the Cloisters from view. The replacing of this solid wall by iron railings has provided not only an uninterrupted view of the Garth and the ancient Monastic remains, but has also opened up to view the whole southern extent of the Cathedral.

The cost of these improvements, amounting to more than £1,000, has been entirely defrayed by the Association of Friends of Rochester Cathedral. And not only as the Dean, but also as a dweller in the Medway Towns, I would like, if I may, Sir, through the columns of your newspaper, to offer an expression of very deep gratitude to the members of the Association for their public-spirited generosity.
